Lobular Breast Cancer accounts for around 15% of all breast cancer diagnoses.

Throughout your treatment it is useful to say

"I am asking this because I have had a Lobular Breast Cancer diagnosis"

There are different types of Lobular tumour, & most share the following characteristics:

- they tend to grow more slowly;
- they grow in a single cell line so rarely present as a lump;
- they are sometimes harder to see on initial imaging, especially if someone has dense breasts;
- the size of your tumour may change following further imaging or surgery;
- there is often more than one tumour.
